	3.3. Explain and demonstrate how to sanitise the area to be treated	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Wipe over the area to be waxed with sanitiser or with a pre-wax treatment</li> </ul>

	3.4. Explain the composition and ingredients of depilatory products and explain their appropriate use	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Hot wax</li> <li>• Warm/cool wax</li> </ul>
	3.5. Describe and demonstrate how to perform a thermal test on self and client	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The heated wax should be tested on the therapist's wrist first to check the temperature</li> <li>• The heated wax should then be tested on the wrist or the ankle of the client to ensure it is not too hot</li> </ul>
	3.6. Explain and demonstrate application of warm/cool wax evenly, sparingly and ensuring cost effectiveness throughout	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Spatula held at right angles to the area to be waxed ensuring that wax drips from the top to the bottom of the spatula ensuring a thin even distribution of wax</li> </ul>
	3.7. Explain and demonstrate application of hot wax evenly ensuring cost effectiveness throughout	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Check length of hair (minimum 1cm)</li> <li>• Trim overly long hairs</li> <li>• Check direction in which hairs grow</li> <li>• Apply wax first against the hair growth or in line with manufacturer's instructions</li> </ul>
	3.8. Explain and demonstrate removal of the product	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Using the appropriate method for the product selected</li> <li>• Ensuring removal is performed in the correct direction, angle and speed</li> <li>• Minimising discomfort to the client</li> </ul>
	3.9. Explain and demonstrate how to clear the area effectively	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Do not re-wax over an area which has already been treated with hot wax</li> <li>• Tweeze out any stray hairs</li> </ul>
	3.10. The learner will be able to explain and demonstrate safe disposal of waste	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Where blood spots may have occurred, care must be taken with the contaminated waste to include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Place in a plastic bag</li> <li>- Put in a separate bin (containing chemical) to be taken away and incinerated</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Explain and demonstrate the ability to work quickly and efficiently to a standard acceptable by the industry	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The treatment should be performed in a commercially acceptable time: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Full leg – 40 minutes</li> <li>- Half leg – 20 minutes</li> <li>- Underarm and bikini – 15 minutes each</li> <li>- Back – 30 minutes</li> <li>- Chest – 20 minutes</li> <li>- Abdomen – 15 minutes</li> <li>- Brazilian – 30-40 minutes</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Hollywood – 45-50 minutes</li> <li>- Lip – 10 minutes</li> <li>- Chin – 10 minutes</li> <li>- Forearms – 20 minutes</li> <li>- Eyebrows – 15 minutes</li> </ul>

Explain and demonstrate accurate updating of client records	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Contra-indications must be checked and noted appropriately</li> <li>• A note should be made of the area(s) to be waxed</li> <li>• Any notes regarding skin's reaction should be made at the end of the treatment</li> <li>• Aftercare advice</li> <li>• Home care advice</li> <li>• Record and store in line with current data protection legislation and professional code of conduct</li> </ul>
