2 About this qualification

2.1 Who is this qualification for?

The Level 4 Diploma in Advanced Aesthetic Treatments is a beauty aesthetic qualification aimed at level 3 qualified practitioners aged 18 and over, who wish to add a range of Advanced Aesthetic Treatments to their repertoire of treatment offerings and proceed to employment as a level 4 Aesthetic Practitioner.

Learners are required to hold a level 2 and 3 regulated beauty therapy qualification or equivalent as a pre-requisite for this qualification.

2.2 What does this qualification cover?

This qualification is informed by employers and national and international standards for aesthetic beauty and developed by technical experts. It includes all the required elements to work effectively as a fully commercial aesthetic practitioner.

Learners must achieve the mandatory unit:

- Principles, practice and ethics of advanced aesthetic therapies
- Investigative consultation for advanced aesthetic therapies
- Skin science for advanced aesthetic therapies

Learners are then required to select a **minimum of 3 optional** units from the identified list, with a collective GLH that adds up to a minimum of **58** to be awarded the Diploma. It is perfectly acceptable to complete more than 3 optional units.

Please note: the Core of Knowledge for Laser and IPL must be taken in conjunction with any IPL or Laser unit.

2.3 Why is this qualification the most suitable?

Because of the flexible nature of the qualification, this qualification is most suitable for anyone wishing to individually tailor the curriculum content that best suits their personal professional development needs. This unique qualification is most suitable for anyone wishing to gain a level 4 qualification in a wide range of advanced aesthetic therapies. Throughout this qualification, learners will develop their knowledge and understanding of relevant principles and practices and advanced and safe skin care protocols for a bespoke selection of aesthetic practices. Learners will also develop the knowledge, understanding and skills required to consult with clients, and provide specific aftercare and home care advice.

2.4 What could this qualification lead to?

The primary purpose of this qualification is to prepare learners for employment as an aesthetic practitioner providing advanced aesthetic treatments. The range and breadth of this qualification means it equip learners to work in a wide variety of work locations such as salons, spas, and clinics.

3 Qualification structure

To be awarded the VTCT (ITEC) Level 4 Diploma in Advanced Aesthetic Treatments, learners must achieve all mandatory units and a minimum of 3 optional units with a minimum collective GLH of 58.

To be awarded this qualification learners must achieve a Pass grade in:

- all mandatory unit assignments and theory examinations
- the external theory examinations for the optional units selected
- the practical examinations for the optional units selected

4 Centre requirements

4.1 Approval and recognition

Existing centres that wish to deliver this qualification must obtain recognition using the standard qualification recognition procedures.

New centres that want to deliver this qualification must gain both centre approval and qualification recognition. Please refer to the VTCT and the ITEC website for further information.

Centre staff should be familiar with current practices and standards in the sector and with the qualification structure, content, assessment and quality assurance arrangements before designing a course programme.

4.2 Resources

Centres must possess the physical resources needed to support the delivery of the programme and the assessment of knowledge and skills, which should therefore be of industry standard. Where specific resources are required these have been indicated in individual units.

- a minimum of 1 couch and 1 trolley per learner
- products, materials and equipment as appropriate to optional units selected for delivery and class numbers, in order to practice sufficiently to meet relevant learning outcomes and assessment criteria in the qualification
- machines as appropriate to optional units selected and class numbers, in order to practise sufficiently to meet all relevant learning outcomes and assessment criteria in the qualification It is the centres responsibility to ensure:
 - all equipment used conforms to up-to-date legislation relating to safe use, such as Electrical Equipment Safety Regulations or current British standards, as applicable
- products used are those approved by EU Cosmetics Regulations for cosmetic use by practitioner or current British standards
- adequate insurance is in place, as recommended by industry, at all times, to include cover for all learners, staff and clients attending VTCT courses

4.3 Teaching staff

In order to deliver this qualification, teaching staff must:

- be occupational experts and have knowledge and understanding in the area for which they are delivering training. This knowledge must be at the same level as or higher than the training being delivered. In the absence of a regulated qualification, staff members will be required to demonstrate Continued Professional Development (CPD) with accredited training providers, for each qualification that the approval application lists. Staff would then be required to agree to update their training to a full qualification within 18 months of being approved to deliver. If for any reason the staff member fails to achieve the qualification, the centre would be required to find another competent member of staff to deliver the program or forfeit the right to deliver the qualification.
- understand the qualification's structure and content, and the learning outcomes they are delivering
- have recent and relevant industry experience in the specific area they are delivering
- have credible experience of teaching and/or providing training
- hold or be actively pursuing an appropriate teaching/training qualification
- undertake activities which contribute to their continuing professional development (CPD)

4.4 Internal assessment

Internal assessment includes internally assessed practical assessments that are provided for each unit, as well as the externally set, internally marked assignments. The lecturer/internal assessor will assess and mark the assignments/case studies and the VTCT (iTEC) external examiner will verify a sample, either in situ on the day of the practical and theory examination or remotely on e-portfolio.

The centre assessors must ensure assessment decisions are consistently applied and that learner work is to the required standard. Each assessor's work will be checked and confirmed by the examiner. Assessment decisions must be standardised to ensure that all learners' work has been assessed to the same standard and is fair, valid and reliable.

4.5 Record keeping

Centres must produce and retain records that include:

- learners on programme, including learner name, date of birth, contact details, lecturers/assessor's details and registration date with VTCT (iTEC)
- assessment plans
- learner assessment records detailing who assessed what and when, the assessment methods used, the location of the supporting evidence, and the assessment decision/grade awarded with supporting evidence

4.6 Total Qualification Time (TQT)

TQT is defined under the Ofqual General Conditions of Recognition, General Condition J1.8, as the number of notional hours which represents an estimate of the total amount of time that could reasonably be expected to be required in order for a learner to achieve and demonstrate achievement of the level of attainment necessary for the award of a qualification.

TQT is comprised of the following two elements:

- the number of hours which an awarding organisation has assigned to a qualification for Guided Learning Hours, and
- an estimate of the number of hours a learner will reasonably be likely to spend in preparation, study or any other form of participation in education or training, including assessment, which takes place as directed – but, unlike Guided Learning Hours, not under the immediate guidance or supervision of – a lecturer, supervisor, tutor or other appropriate provider of education or training.

The TQT for this qualification is detailed in Section 3 of this specification.

5 Assessment

5.1 Summary of assessment methods

This qualification comprises internal and external assessments. Learners must achieve the assessments detailed in the table below.

Assessment method	Overview of controls
External theory examinations (BT4D5.EX1) – for the mandatory units.	Externally set and externally marked examinations. The examinations assess knowledge and understanding from the breadth of the mandatory units at the end of the period of learning.
External theory examinations for the optional units.	Externally set and externally marked examinations. The examinations assess knowledge and understanding from the breadth of the chosen treatment specific units, at the end of the period of learning.
External practical examinations – (optional units only) Please refer to 5.2 for information on specific unit examination code. There will be a minimum of 3 practical examinations, depending on the number of optional units chosen.	Externally set, examined and marked by an external examiner. Overarching examination that assesses the learner’s technical skills and abilities. The practical examination will take place at the end of the period of learning.
Assignments (BT4D5.SAR) – to cover some of the learning outcomes in the mandatory units.	Externally set and internally marked. This is a prerequisite evidence requirement which must be completed prior to learners undertaking the external examination.
Case studies – are required for all of the optional units, except the core of knowledge for laser and IPL.	Externally set and internally marked. This is a prerequisite evidence requirement which must be completed prior to learners undertaking the external examinations. The case studies can be evidenced as the treatments conducted during training.

5.3 Theory Examination

Theory examinations are externally set and externally marked by VTCT (iTEC).

The specification for the external theoretical examination is detailed below.

Type of examination	A series of individual subject specific examinations made up of multiple-choice questions, to cover the assessment criteria within the unit.

Examinations must be undertaken by learners under controlled examination conditions in accordance with VTCT's policies and procedures for external assessment.

5.3.1 Retaking external theory examinations

Learners who fail to achieve the required grade are permitted to re-sit after having sufficient teaching and additional study time. There is no limit to the number of retakes a learner may undertake.

5.3.2 Reasonable adjustments and special considerations

Information on the reasonable adjustments allowed for the external examinations within this qualification can be found in the Policies section on the VTCT website and ITEC websites.

5.4 Assignment (BT4D5.SAR) – short answer response

This on demand summative assignment will be used to measure the learner's knowledge and understanding of the supporting theory linked to advanced aesthetic treatments. The short answer response assignment will target indicative content from within the mandatory unit specifications which is of a lower priority compared to the knowledge and understanding assessed in the external objective examination. For example, the historical context of aesthetic treatments. Centres can access the short answer response assignment brief from the VTCT website.

5.5 External Practical Examinations

The content of practical Learning Outcomes (LO's) is covered by a practical examinations and case studies.

The practical examinations will be conducted by an external examiner through direct observation at the centre.

VTCT carries out a range of quality assurance activities to monitor the standards of assessment taking place in centres.

In preparation for the external practical examinations, centres are advised to ensure learners have carried out a series of case studies comprising of complete practical treatments for all modalities studied, in accordance with the awarding organisation's practical assessment documentation and marking criteria, which must be observed and marked by the centre lecturer/assessors. All treatments must be deemed commercially acceptable by the centre lecturer/assessors.

It is essential centres use the practical assessment documents provided in order to make assessment judgments when preparing for examinations. This can be found on a secure portal area on the VTCT and ITEC websites.

The Practical Examinations must take place under controlled conditions, in a realistic working environment on a real client and in a commercially acceptable timeframe for the practical treatment being examined.

5.5.1 Retaking external practical examinations

Learners who fail to achieve the required Pass mark are permitted to re-sit after having sufficient teaching and additional study time.

5.5.2 Reasonable adjustments and special considerations

Information on the reasonable adjustments allowed for the external practical examinations within this qualification can be found in the Policies section on the VTCT and iTEC websites.

5.6 Case studies

The case studies/portfolio of evidence is an evidence requirement which must be completed prior to learners undertaking the practical and theoretical examinations.

The awarding organisation specifies the amount of case studies to be carried out and evidenced in the portfolio within the unit specifications. These can be found on the VTCT and ITEC websites on the relevant qualification page.

The case studies/portfolio of evidence can be used as a confirmatory and formative assessment to prepare learners for the practical and theoretical examinations. The purpose of this portfolio is to evaluate learner performance and use the information gathered to shape and improve learners' performance in preparation for summative examination. Centres should also consider the use of formative self and peer assessment as part of the learning journey.

Whilst the case studies/portfolio of evidence do not contribute to the overall grade, they will be marked pass or fail by the centre lecturer/assessor and sampled by the external examiner.

5.7 Authentication of learner work

Whilst the majority of units in this qualification require evidence to be produced for assessment under direct supervision and highly controlled conditions, some units require learners to produce evidence without supervision.

Where this is the case, centres must be confident that learners' work is authentic. In such cases, learners must complete a Declaration of Authenticity to confirm that the work produced is their own. This must be countersigned by an assessor. A Declaration of Authenticity form is available to download from the VTCT website.

Centres must ensure that all learner evidence is available to the EQA.

The authentication of learner evidence is the responsibility of the centre.

6 External Examiner

6.1 External Examiner visits

This qualification is externally examined by the awarding organisation. Centres delivering this qualification will have a quality assurance visit each time an examiner visits the centre.

On a centre visit an examiner:

- Examines all learners entered for the external practical examination
- Samples learners' internal assessments
- Verifies that appropriate staff and sufficient resources are in place, and that the centre is continuing to meet the criteria specified in the centre contract
- Checks that the centre's policies and procedures continue to meet the awarding organisation's requirements
- Verifies internal assessments

6.2 Spot checking

In addition to the scheduled practical examination visits, targeted and unannounced spot checks of centres delivering this qualification will be undertaken as part of the awarding organisation's formal quality assurance process.

6.3 Support and guidance

Unit specifications, consultation sheets and internal assessment materials are available to support qualification delivery and assessment.
